IN MEMORIAM: Honorable James T. Phillips

former mayor of Old Bridge Township July 8, 1953 - February 1, 2014 (Middlesex Cty Freeholder: 1990-1995, State Senator: 1991, County Treasurer, Old Bridge Twp Mayor: 2003-2011)

Another sad passing of member & friend of the Society, the Honorable James T. Phillips passed away on February 1st, of this year. Born on July 8, 1953 and raised in Laurence Harbor, his parents (Hon.) John A. "Jack" Phillips and Lois M. Phillips (nee: Pellinger) instilled in James the dedication to serve the community and to help make our hometown a better place for all.

("Jack" Phillips terms: Councilman 1958-1962, Mayor 1960-1962, Middlesex County Freeholder 1962-1983 and County Deputy director 1973-1983).

Close to home, he was instrumental in curbing overdevelopment, creating "Open Space" recreation facilities and amenities for our township. From the revitalization of Laurence Harbor Waterfront Park, the establishment of the John A. Phillips Park & Preserve, the YMCA & Manino Park, to the Costello Home & Maher Manor (affordable housing for seniors and the disabled) and lastly the preservation of the Cottrell Homestead, his efforts for the improvement of our town will be long remembered.

Our condolences go out to his family. Mayor Jim, you will be greatly missed.

CURATOR'S CORNER—Kate Philbrick

Despite some dicey, real-winter weather effecting museum hours and operation, we have received many new acquisitions from those who braved the elements! Some are too numerous to itemize individually here (books and 78 LPs in particular) so please bear with me for the sake of brevity.

Since the unfortunate passing of Mr. Herbert Cottrell, his daughter Pat has delivered to the museum several items of note from the family. These include a large collection of 78 record albums and schoolbooks used by some of the Cottrell boys when attending Glenwood Military Academy in Matawan. (Several were used by, and signed by, Judson Cottrell)

We also received a large gouache style painting of Garrett Cottrell, the family's forebear who is responsible for the construction of the homestead on the corner of Cottrell Rd and 516. Unfortunately, the cardboard on which it was painted is quite brittle and cracked at one corner when cleaned. However, it does not mar the image and is currently on display at the museum.

A wonderful selection of four vintage quilts was also donated by Pat Cottrell, having originally come from her mother's family to NJ when her parents married. They are approximately 70-80 years old.

Of particular note among the Cottrell items are a small binder containing original paperwork and stock certificates for the New Jersey Apple Grower's Association, and a wonderful scale model of a portion of the Distillery, also currently on display.

Also added to our collection recently was a binder of Lambertson Family Genealogy, featuring family line for Maud and Isabel (Belle), whose small Daily Food Sunday School books are included. (1912 dedication). Compiled and donated by Lora Tilton Capozzoli.

Pat Schuck donated a vintage chenille bedspread, a very nice addition to our domestic textile collection. Chenille is French for caterpillar, which obviously refers to that recognizable style.

Member Deborah Stanley has likewise added to the museum's growing collection of local and historical artifacts from items found in the home of her late father-in-law. These include:

WWII era canvas, wood and metal cot, likely military issue
Long bamboo fly fishing rod and reel
Ceramic syringe sterilizer
Trophy and plaque for service to Madison Township community
Straight razor in box
Dexter brand hand stitching machine
Hard cover cookbook, marked Wartime Edition
Two rolls vintage 1960s Kodak camera film in original boxes (unexposed)
Small St. Christopher's medal, with image of old touring car

Of especial note from Deb is a great folder full of correspondence and newspaper clippings regarding the Central Park Boys' Club--- an organization about which we had very little or nothing concerning. It contains a wealth of info, and includes a copy of a newsprint magazine from 1963, called the *Madison Independent*. This is a great find and full of photos, places and names from the township's past.

In Memoriam: Herbert Cottrell, Jr.

March 8, 1918-October 21, 2013

It is with great sadness that we announce that Herbert Cottrell, at the age of 95, has passed away. Mr. Cottrell was a lifelong resident of our Township, with a family lineage that dates back to the founding families of our State.

Many of you may know of his residence, the grand Georgian/Federal style home (circa 1831), that sits across the street from the township municipal center. In this home Mr. Cottrell was raised by his father Herbert Cottrell Sr., and his mother Wilhema Brautgan. Herbert Jr.'s grandparents were William H. Cottrell & Louisa Ely. His great-grandparents were Garrett Cottrell & Hannah Herbert, the original occupants of the homestead and lands that came as part of the dowry of the Herbert/Warne linage. For almost 200 years, the Cottrell family occupied the homestead, conducted nursery operations, and after the repeal of Prohibition, ran the successful Apple Growers Association, and Applejack distillery.

Mr. Cottrell spent his early life in his father's footsteps, as an avid apple grower & agriculturalist for the Apple Growers Association (founded by Herbert Sr., and his brothers) that produced the finest apple crops in the area. Heinz Co. had an contract for of apples for baby food. The eventual rights of the applejack production "Browntown Apple Brandy" were sold to family friends, the Laird Company of Colts Neck.

(Hannah Herbert, the Grand-daughter of Obadiah Herbert 1731-1777 & Elizabeth Warne 1739-1822. Elizabeth Warne: daughter of Joshua Warne & Elizabeth Throckmorton, and granddaughter of Thomas Warne "proprietor" & Mary Lord Carhart).

After his graduation from Matawan High School, in 1937 not only did he help on the farm, but traveled extensively when the opportunity presented itself.

Mr. Cottrell was called to serve his country in 1942, and completed his Officer Candidate School training at Fort Benning GA, with the rank of 1st Lieutenant (he was also a graduate of the Ranger School at Camp Forrest, Tenn). He fought at Normandy Beach on D-day and the Battle of the Bulge. Wounded twice in battle, he received the Purple Heart. His meritorious accomplishments were such that he was honorably discharged in 1947.

It was during his early military career, that he met his first wife Rebecca Weaver of Bessemer, Alabama. Ms. Weaver was serving as an Army Medical Corp nurse during Lt. Cottrell's station at Camp McCain, Miss. Through a chance encounter, well really a kitchen misunderstanding, (please see Mr. Cottrell's oral history disc at the Museum), they met and began a love affair that resulted in their marriage in Sept 25, 1943 at Camp McCain, Miss. Rebecca passed away at the age of 42 in Nov. 1963, after twenty years of marriage, and two children, Patricia & William.

Herbert Cottrell, Jr. (continued)

Herbert Jr. married a second time in 1968 to Joan Brown Green, (daughter of Lewis Brown & Mary Brown nee: Quackenbush) a teacher of Business Education at Madison Township High School. This marriage merged more family ties of ancient note within the township. Joan passed away March 24, 1969.

Mr. Cottrell was the descendent of the early Founding Families of New Jersey. Thomas Warne "the proprietor", The Herberts of Gravesend LI & Monmouth Cty., and Throckmortons of Middletown, Monmouth Ctv, as well as the Cottrells of Middletown, Monmouth Cty.

We are honored to acknowledge all of the contributions that Mr. Cottrell made during the early founding of our Society. Last year, Mr. Cottrell attended one of the general membership meetings to answer questions from the group, following the screening of the video interview conducted by members of the society. The video, which covers memories of his life, as well as the history of his family, is available for viewing any time in the museum. Mr. Cottrell's family has donated many family items to the museum, and these will be on display for the next few months.
